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INTRODUCTION

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Clean4Change is an open-sourced, global movement to encourage cleanup actions, launched by the Alliance to End Plastic Waste.

With our launch on Earth Day in 2021, we have engaged with diverse audiences around the world and motivated them to adopt cleanup behaviours. And to date, we have collectively picked up **more that 1.5 million pieces of litter** all over the world.

We know that employee and citizen engagement is possible if everyone believes that keeping our environment clean is a shared responsibility between **governments**, **local authorities**, **organisations and individuals**.

Clean4Change will be the catalyst to inspire that change through education, empowerment and collective action.

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CLEANUP MANUAL

HOW TO USE THIS GUIDE

This guide will provide you with useful tips and tricks for your cleanup journey. Click on the headers below to explore each section.



SAFETY

COVID-19 guidelines

Check with local regulations or government websites on guidelines for organising cleanup events within your community. Ensure that you keep within safe-distancing measures, all participants are vaccinated, and group sizes follow the recommended number.

Weather

Be sure to check the weather forecast in the days leading up to your event and come up with a wet weather plan. If the weather changes midway through the cleanup, especially if there is risk of lightning, stop all activity and seek shelter.

Attire

Wear masks covering your nose and mouth, close-toed shoes, and clothes you don't mind getting dirty. Do apply insect repellent or sunblock if needed.

Wildlife

If you encounter wildlife, remain calm and refrain from making sudden movements. Avoid direct eye contact and move away slowly. Respect their habitat, and do not attempt to feed, pet or provoke them. Seek medical attention immediately if bitten or scratched.

Finding dangerous objects

If you find medical waste (syringes, etc.), biohazards, weapons, or any other suspicious objects, do not touch or remove them. Instead, contact the relevant authorities with the location and a photo.

SINGAPORE

SAFETY

COVID-19 guidelines

Keep group sizes up to 5 pax and practise a minimum of 1 metre social distancing at cleanup sites. If you are unsure about your symptoms, stay at home or check it at <u>https://www.sgcovidcheck.gov.sg/</u>

Weather

Be sure to check the weather forecast in the days leading up to your event and come up with a wet weather plan. If the weather changes midway through the cleanup, especially if there is risk of lightning, stop all activity and seek shelter.

Attire

Wear masks covering your nose and mouth, close-toed shoes, and clothes you don't mind getting dirty. Do apply insect repellent or sunblock if needed.

Wildlife

If you encounter wildlife, remain calm and refrain from making sudden movements. Avoid direct eye contact and move away slowly. Respect their habitat, and do not attempt to feed, pet or provoke them. Seek medical attention immediately if bitten or scratched.

If you find a wild animal that is obviously in distress or severely injured, you can call the ACRES Wildlife Rescue Hotline on 9783 7782 using these pointers:

- Describe the animal to the rescue officer (type of animal, size, colour, markings or distinct features).
- Describe any injuries.
- Let them know if any other animals are nearby.

Finding dangerous or religious objects

If you find medical waste (syringes, etc.), biohazards, weapons, religious items, or other suspicious objects, do not touch or remove them. Instead, contact the relevant authorities with the location and a photo.

Where can you start your cleanups?

- Anywhere! Remember, if these places can't be accessed without a guide, do not try them yourselves.
- Also, keep track of the time, do not go after dark.

Common areas for cleanups

• Parks, neighbourhoods, vacant lots, roadsides, school yards, rivers/streams, historic or tourist areas, hiking/biking/nature trails, or any place that needs cleaning.

Things to take note of

LOCATION

- Always remember to seek permission with the relevant authorities before conducting your cleanups.
- If there are difficult trails or areas that are not easy to access, determine who would be joining your cleanup crew to see if it is accessible for them. If not, choose a different location.
- Should you decide to proceed with a location that may be difficult to navigate, indicate in your event that some places are not child/elderly friendly.
- Keep a health declaration form on hand for all participants to sign once they have arrived at your event.

TRANSPORT

Private hire buses

Check with companies that provide private transport services, if the area requires a bigger group participation (50 pax or more).

Cars, motorcycles, or taxis

Survey the location for parking spots, landmarks or drop off/pick-up areas that participants can easily locate on the map.

Public transport

Do see if there are options for people to access the area through the main transport network. Using landmarks, describe where they should alight and how long it would take to walk to the location from that stop.

PLANNING

• Survey the area beforehand, including the route you are going to take and the area you intend to cover. If there are areas that are cordoned off, mark it in your map and share it with the group.

- Take note of any wildlife you may encounter and remind the group what to do if they see any.
- Draft or update the safety briefing for the participants and add in relevant details from your previous assessment of the area, if any. Once completed, distribute these details to participants beforehand so they know what to do on the day of the cleanup.
- Ensure there are a minimum of 2 people in each group and that they have enough materials for their cleanups. Distribute important contact details of group leaders, guides (if any), and emergency contacts.
- Assign an area to gather post-cleanup, and a drop-off zone for trash disposal. Assign each group an area to cleanup.
- Make sure each group has a leader. Check in with the leader to ensure the group keeps to its location and check on their safety.

DISPOSAL

Overlooked trash is litter and litter is not only ugly—it can also be dangerous. Plastic bags, cigarette butts, fishing line, and other trash can be harmful to our environment when not properly disposed of.

- Confirm cleanup boundaries—arrange for drop-off locations with the local waste haulers or sanitation department.
- Collate information on litter category and material by the participants. By identifying, logging the type and material of collected litter, environmental groups can find ways to prevent them from being littered again.
- Segregate recyclables and non-recyclables from one another.
- Do not put sharp waste together with others. Separate those and put them into containers.
- Tie up the trash bags after you have collected the litter. Make sure they are secure and, if there are tears, double bag them.
- Contact relevant authorities or departments to request for free dumpsters and/or coordinate with local waste haulers and recyclers on the pickup, transport, and disposal of the collected trash/recyclables.

DEBRIEF

Ending a cleanup is just as important as starting one.

Debrief the group after the cleanup. Here are several points you may want to include.

- Thank your participants for their help and encourage them to post about their participation on their social media accounts.
- Suggest using the hashtags #clean4change, sharing before and after photos of the cleanup, and tagging their family and friends on social media so that they can share the post and encourage participation amongst the community.
- Share information on how changes can happen when everyone helps to cleanup.
- Ask your participants questions to reflect on the activity. Some questions include:
 - Why are these objects dumped here?
 - What are some ways we can better handle waste management?
 - How do we ensure responsible waste management from individuals?
- Include other information or questions that may be helpful for your event.

CLEANUP DAY

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BEFORE THE CLEANUP

- Refer to your checklist to make sure you have all the materials you need for the cleanup. (<u>Refer to Annex A</u>)
- Ensure everyone is in appropriate attire for the cleanup.
- Bring your phone or camera.
- Set up a check-in station and first aid station.
- Distribute trash bags, gloves and litter pickers amongst the participants.
- Make sure group leaders are in place at designated locations and that groups have at least 1 person recording the trash data.
- Bring paper and a pen to record the results of trash items collected.

DURING THE CLEANUP

- Take lots of photos! Showing before and after photos is a great way track your progress, celebrate your impact, and to motivate others to join in the next cleanup.
- Hydrate yourselves throughout the cleanup, especially on a hot day. Rest under shade if you feel tired or dizzy.
- Adhere to the safety guidelines.
- Use an app (Litterati, Clean Swell, etc.) or a checklist to record the litter collected.

AFTER THE CLEANUP

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- If possible, weigh and count the trash and recyclables you collected during your cleanup. (<u>Refer to Annex B</u>)
- Dispose or wash gloves immediately after your cleanup. To properly remove disposable gloves, grab the glove opening near your wrist and pull towards your fingers, turning the glove inside out before disposing.
- Wash your hands thoroughly as soon as possible. Use hand sanitiser in the meantime, if soap and water are unavailable.
- Take photos of the trash collected.
- Dispose of your trash collected properly.
- Debrief your participants.

INSTRUCTIONS

Use the spreadsheet template for recording waste data.

STEP 1

MEASURING

IMPACT 1

(WEIGHING SCALE)

Have a participant stand on the scale (without holding anything) and record their initial weight. (Measurement A)

STEP 2

Have the same participant hold a trashbag or two and record the combined weight of the volunteer and the waste. (Measurement B)

STEP 4

Subtract weight B from A. That would be the weight of the trash bag. Repeat Steps 3 & 4 until all the trash bags have been weighed.

INSTRUCTIONS

Use the spreadsheet template for recording waste data.

STEP 1

Have a participant secure the load onto the luggage scale.

STEP 2

Have the participant hold a bag of waste, release the bag and record the mass of the trash bag on the data sheet.

MEASURING IMPACT 3 (LITTERATI)

What is Litterati?

Available on <u>iOS</u> and <u>Android</u>, Litterati is a free mobile app that uses Al technology to empower people to clean the planet. Users get to contribute to the crowdsourced Global Litter Database that keeps track of the different types of litter found in a location.

To ensure that the actions taken can be recorded accurately, each company should provide their unique Litterati challenge code to the friends and families of their employees. This data will then be collated onto a dashboard and can be made available upon request.

How does Litterati work?

You can photograph the individual pieces of trash collected with your phone. The app then allows you to document litter and have access to the Litterati filtered data and visualisations for creating individual impact.

You can also create a challenge to encourage others around you to join and create a combined impact.

MEASURING IMPACT 4 (CLEAN SWELL)

What is Clean Swell?

Available on <u>iOS</u> and <u>Android</u>, Clean Swell[®] is a free mobile app that makes recording your trash pickup progress fun and simple.

With Clean Swell[®], tap on "Start Collecting" trash wherever you are around the world and the data you collect will be uploaded to the Ocean Conservancy's global ocean trash database.

This data delivers a global snapshot of ocean trash, providing researchers and policy makers insight to make informed decisions and solutions. Join the thousands of International Coastal Cleanup[™] volunteers who are working for a cleaner ocean by picking up the millions of pounds of trash that wash onto beaches around the world.

You can even check out your Cleanup history anytime to see how you've helped make the oceans a cleaner and healthier ecosystem.
